

Health care profession concerned with the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of disorders of the neuromusculoskeletal system and the effects of these disorders on general health.



Chiropractors

- Treatment: Manual Therapy,
- including manipulation of the
- spine, other joints, and soft
- tissues: treatment also includes
- exercises and health and
- lifestyle counseling.



Chiropractics

Chiropractors can also treat: digestive disorders, asthma, numbness, recurrent colds, sciatic, chronic fatigue, chest pain, headache, sports injury

CMCC's undergraduate program meets the education requirements established for the practice of chiropractic and is recognized by regulatory bodies in:

Completion of the Undergraduate degree program will lead to a <u>Doctor of</u> <u>Chiropractic degree.</u>

Admissions

CGPA of 2.50 on a 4.00 grade point scale: Average GPA of admitted students is 3.1

 Must complete at least three full years of undergraduate university study in Canada (15 full year courses or 90 credit hours).
 Complete as of May 31st of the year in which one applies in.

Proficiency in English

► No pre requisite courses needed.

Admissions

Recommended courses:

- One full course (with labs): organic chemistry and biology
- One Half Course: introductory psychology
- One and One Half Course: Humanities and or Social Sciences
- Class of 192 students—average of 500 applicants each year

Application Process

Part A - Complete the Online Admission Application and Fee Form.

Part B - Complete the Online Course and Grades for the schools attended.

Application Process

Part C - Have official academic transcripts sent directly to CMCC.

Part D - All applications must be accompanied by a non refundable fee by credit card, certified cheque or money order payable to CMCC Admissions. Value: \$150.00 (CD).

Published Deadline: CLOSED Friday October 31st, 2014 was the deadline for the 2015 admission cycle.

Interview Process

- Interviews are granted if applicants meet the undergraduate CGPA
- The personal interview lasts approximately 30 minutes
- The interview team considers: communication, collaboration, management, health advocacy, scholarship and professionalism
- Day of Interview: bring proof of identity (government id: driver's license/passport)

Interview Process

Recommend applicants gain:

chiropractic experience: through job shadowing/volunteering at a chiropractic clinic or becoming a chiropractic patient

Conduct your own research on the chiropractic profession

All applicants will be notified of their application outcome by mid March.

Before Starting...

- Must attend Orientation
- Health Evaluation Letter confirming applicant has no health impediment that would restrict entry to the program
- Two Step TB test positive must be reported to Admissions

Program Outline

Four year Doctor of Chiropractic (DC) Degree Program

Year I & Year II

For the first two years of study, students build a foundation of knowledge, and learn how to integrate this knowledge into clinical cases

Program Outline

Year III

- In Year III students are exposed to an increasing amount of case-based material in order to prepare them for the role of student intern (Yr IV) in the CMCC clinic system.
- The basic sciences from Years I and II are integrated into the clinical and diagnostic sciences, laboratory diagnosis, pathology, and clinical nutrition classes.

Program Outline

Year IV

Students take part in two six-month internships in CMCC's teaching clinics, on campus and in communities throughout

the Greater Toronto Area, under the

supervision of clinical faculty.

Chiropractic Education

Graduate from an accredited DC Program.



CCEB National Competency Examinations

Candidates who wish to practice chiropractic in a Canadian province must obtain a <u>CCEB Certificate</u>.

Application for Licensure

Once a chiropractor has graduated from an accredited DC Program and obtained a CCEB Certificate, he or she must apply for licensure in a Canadian province. Each <u>Provincial Licencing Office</u> has unique requirements for licensure and should be contacted as soon as possible.



CCEB National Competency Examination

- Canadian Chiropractic Examining Board (CCEB)
 Offered 3x/year February, June & October
- Component A Chiropractic Knowledge
- Component B Clinical Decision Making & Diagnostic Imaging

Application for Licensure

After graduation from an accredited DC program and obtaining a CCEB Certificate, you must apply for licensure in a Canadian province

Please note that each province has unique requirements for provincial licensure



College of Chiropractors of Ontario (CCO)

- Obtained CCEB Certificate by completing component A and B
- Complete CCO Legislation and Ethics Examination (offered during the same week as CCEB exams)
 - Offered 3x/year
 - Open book examination & 2 Hours
 - Cost: \$180
